Why the 25th?

It's a well-known fact that Christmas is celebrated on the twenty-fifth of December due to this being the date of Jesus' birthday. A slightly less known fact is that nowhere in the Bible is it stated that Jesus' birthday is the 25th of December. Many modern scholars have attempted to answer the question of why this date was chosen to be the Messiah's birthday, with plenty of theories and speculation being thrown into the ring.

The most widely popular theory on why December 25th was chosen is due to it previously being a pagan holiday. Paganism was most prevalent during the Roman Empire, with one of its traditions being the birth of Sol Invictus, translating to Unconquered Son. The Roman Emperor Aurelian pronounced the 25th of December to be this date the 25th of December. Later on in the 4th century, Emperor Constantine the Great took over; he was different to the previous emperors due to being a Christian. As such, he wished to convert the Roman people into Christians. Many people believe that Constantine pronounced the 25th of December to be Jesus' birthday in order to co-opt the popularity and presence of the previous Pagan holiday, in an effort to draw pagans into Catholicism. It's sort of like a sequel to a film relying on the people the original movie drew in.

This theory has some truth to it; the Romans did make an attempt to establish Christianity at the cost of Paganism, with Pope Gregory suggesting converting Pagan temples into churches. But there is no evidence of Christians adopting Pagan rituals at the time, making it very unlikely that this is how Jesus' birth date was established. However, this absolutely happened in the 12th century, in which the date of Christmas was shifted from January 6th to December 25th so that it would coincide with Sol Invictus' birth. While this does prove that there was a deliberate attempt to erase Paganism, it doesn't show where the original 25th date came from. And where did January 6th come from?



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A more accurate theory on how Jesus' birth date was decided on at the time was the date of his death. It is believed that Jesus died on the same day of the year he was conceived, which was suggested in an anonymously published treatise titled "On Solstices and Equinoxes". "For on that day he was conceived on the same suffered."

As such, the date nine months after Jesus' death would be his birth date. Around 200 C.E, Tertullian of Carthage calculated that March 25th was the date of Jesus' death, which would make the 25th of December his birthday. The date January 6th came from the Eastern Roman Empire, where it was determined that his death would be on the 14th of the first spring month in the Hebrew calendar; April 6th in ours. Once again, this would make his birthday the 6th of January. Interestingly, this draws Christmas much closer to Judaism than Paganism as the celebration of Passover places an emphasis on creation and redemption should occur at the same time.

To conclude, the roots of Christmas' origins are tied to the works of ancient scholars who determined the original 25th date, partly using Judaism's influence. However, in the oncoming centuries, the date was weaponized as another form of Pagan erasure. In modern times, the origins of Christmas tend to have such little significance that the purpose and meaning of Christmas has been diluted to the point that even a large majority of Atheists celebrate the holiday. It is important to acknowledge the often-controversial history behind modern traditions, but to not let ourselves become so drowned out in concern for the past that we forget to enjoy the present. Spend time with your loved ones, have a Yule log, drink some hot chocolate, and please have a Merry Christmas.


Journalists at the Cadbury Chronicle interviewed Ms Dutta to find out more about her experiences as a librarian.


Clubs at DEC






Book Review: The Person Controller




